



CPC Duties per 2002 Bylaw - 2

2. The CPC shall make recommendations to the Town Meeting for the acquisition, creation and preservation of open space, for the acquisition and preservation of historic resources, for the acquisition, creation and preservation of historic for the creation of land for recreational use, for the creation, preservation and support of community housing and for rehabilitation or restoration of such open space, historic resources, land for recreational use and community housing that is acquired or created as provided in this section. ... reuse of existing buildings or construction of new buildings on previously developed sites.

CPC Duties per 2002 Bylaw – 3

3. The CPC may include in its recommendation to the Town Meeting a recommendation to set aside for later spending funds for specific purposes that are consistent with community preservation but for which sufficient revenues are not available in the Community Preservation Fund to accomplish the specific purpose or to set aside for later spending funds for general purposes that are consistent with community preservation.







Based on your CPA's primary interests, please rank in order of one to four the four CPA areas below, with one being the area you consider most important.


Survey Priority Area — Open Space




Survey Priority Area — Affordable Housing



Survey Priority Area — Historic




Survey Priority Area — Recreation




Survey Priority Area – All Areas

CPA Primary Interests Combined




Number of Particpants

Does Norwell's Participation in the CPA Improve the Quality of Life for Town Residents?




t is Important That Norwell Participates in the Community Preservation Program?


Priority Projects by Categories





Open Space Project Ideas

- Expand the town's greenway and pathways
- Connect Norwell's greenways to abutting communities
- Develop a North River greenway
- Acquire more open space
- Continue to develop the Hemingway Garden and wildflower field
- Preserve Norwell's rural character



Affordable Housing Ideas

- Small scale housing projects
- Affordable housing for seniors and town employees
- Multifamily housing
- Develop affordable housing on the Carlton, Wildcat or St. Helen's properties
- Evaluate unused buildings for affordable housing
- Use town land for affordable housing
- Combine a community center with senior affordable housing

Sidewalks




Other Ideas (not allowable under the CPA)

Plan Development Process -3

3. Data from surveys will be analyzed, an initial plan prepared, and a public hearing held. The initial plan will then be integrated into a document which provides a CPA overview, history of the Norwell CPA participation, application guidelines, and other relevant information.
