FY'16 Senior Work Program

As you probably know, this program is seeing some changes. For the first time, there will be a financial "means test" for those who wish to be in the program and have income below the circuit breaker tax credit, (check DOR Schedule 2013CB). In addition, the Assessor's Office will be handling any tax issues that may arise. This part of the program is called Tier 1. Confidentiality is top priority and will only be handled by selected staff.

The intent or theme of this successful program is the same. Individuals over 60 with certain skills that can assist a town department while supporting their goal to get credit on their municipal property tax bill. After a number of years, we have finally reached the \$1,000 level. To add to this, the new minimum wage will now be \$9.00. Applications are out there, you can get one at Town Hall at Barbara Childs, Human Resources office. Any questions or would like more information, you may contact Barbara Childs, Barbara Gingras or Rosemary O'Connor. If you are interested, please get an application as soon as possible. The deadline for completing the program is November 15, 2015.

OUTREACH NEWS From Dee Dee Obert

I have received some inquires lately regarding the recent increase in the cost of electricity from National Grid.

I did some research on this subject and I cannot stress enough the importance of thoroughly checking the fine print before signing a contract. Unfortunately there are some companies that after the introductory period will increase their rates and savings will be minimal or non existent. In some cases the reviews of certain suppliers stated the rates rose to be greater than National Grid.

If you do not have access to a computer and would like to research a company please feel free to come to the Council on Aging to use the computers in the computer lab. If you would like assistance in your research please contact me and I will be happy to assist you in researching a supplier.

The most frequently asked questions that were listed on National Grid's website are listed here.

How do I find a supplier? Lists of suppliers that are eligible to provide energy to customers in Na-

tional Grids service area are available at the COA or you can access the Energy Supplier List at the National Grid Website. You are free to contact the suppliers to compare offers and make a choice.

Is it mandatory that I choose a different supplier? No. If you do nothing, National Grid will continue to supply your energy and associated delivery services until you choose a competitive supplier.

If I do purchase my energy from another supplier, will I have to worry about the reliability of my energy service? No. Service quality and reliability should stay the same. You will continue to have access to National Grids customer service representatives during business hours and their crews will still respond to emergencies and power outages.

Who do I call if there is an emergency? You will continue to call National Grid in case of an emergency such as a power outage.

How will I be billed? It depends on the supplier you choose. You may receive two bills: one from National Grid for the delivery of your energy, and another from your supplier for the energy itself. You may also have the choice of a single bill from National Grid which will contain a separate line for supply charges.

Will I save money if I purchase my energy from a competitive supplier? Your savings will depend on several things:

- How much you pay now for the energy you purchase.
- How much energy you use.
- Your agreement with the supplier.

Can a supplier turn off my service? No. Only National Grid is authorized to connect or disconnect your service.

Once I choose another supplier, may I change back to National Grid? Check the terms and conditions of the contract with your supplier. A customer who chooses to discontinue service with a supplier and wants to resume receiving energy from National Grid can have the supplier return the account to National Grid, or the customer may contact National Grid directly to have the account returned to them. **How do I enroll in the program?** You must contact a competitive energy supplier. If you and the supplier agree that you will buy your energy from them, they will then contact National Grid to enroll your account.

If I have questions about my bill, whom do I

call? If your questions relate to the delivery portion of the bill, please **contact National** Grid. For questions about the supply portion of the bill, call the supplier at the number provided on your bill.

Important Considerations Should You Choose

to Switch National Grid cannot endorse suppliers or advise you to choose one over the other. However, if you are considering buying energy from someone other than them, make sure to get the following information from the supplier:

- What is the term of the contract?
- Are there minimum bill amounts?
- Are the energy prices fixed, or will they change throughout the term?
- Are there penalties for early termination of the contract?
- Will the supplier bill you directly, or will charges be included in National Grids bill?
- What is included in the price per kWh?

Please check the eligibility guidelines listed in the Newsletter for Fuel Assistance, if you are eligible and receive fuel assistance you will also receive a reduction on your electricity regardless of the type of fuel you use to heat your home.

FILING FOR FUEL ASSISTANCE

Applications are being accepted for the 2014/2015 fuel assistance program. Eligibility is based on household size and the gross annual income of every household member 18 years of age or older. Household income cannot exceed 60% of the estimated State Median Income.

The FY 2015 income cannot exceed \$32,618 for a household of one and \$42,654 for a household of two which is 60% of the Estimated State Median Income.

The program provides assistance through a fixed benefit amount for the cost of the primary source of heat which includes but is not limited to:

Oil, Electricity, Natural gas, Propane, Kerosene, Wood, Coal

Payments for actual usage or fuel delivery are made

directly to the heating vendor for primary energy needs from November 1^{st} to April 30^{th} except when the cost of heating is included in the rent.

If eligible discounts are automatically given on electric bills for investor owned electric utilities, and gas bills for investor-owned gas utilities.

NOTARY SERVICE AVAILABLE AT COA

Outreach Coordinator Dee Dee Obert is also a Notary Public. If you need to have anything notarized, feel free to stop by the COA for assistance.

TELEPHONE REASSURANCE

Telephone reassurance provides a personal telephone call(s) to individuals who may be frail, at medical risk, or those who may live alone. The program gives individuals the comfort and security they need to maintain their independence, knowing that someone is checking in with them on a regular basis. Calls can be made as frequently as needed. If an individual cannot be reached, a designated family member, neighbor or friend will be contacted to ensure an individual is safe. If you or someone you know can benefit from this invaluable service, please contact Dee Dee Obert at the COA office at 781-659-7878.

Science and History of the North River

Facilitator: Bob Jackman Wednesdays, 10:00 to 11:30 a.m., Cost \$20 Jan. 14 to Feb. 18 (2/25 & 3/4 snow dates)

This new offering focuses on the North River Basin, the geological processes that created it, its modification by erosion and deposition, and human habitation within the basin over the last 6,000 years. The course will draw extensively on both historic and modern maps, and utilize some graphics that can be employed to look back through time.

Themes will include the geological formation of the North River, the transformation of the Scituate, Marshfield, and river coast lines over the past millennia, Native American habitation of the North River, shipbuilding and dredging along the North River, packet trading on the North River, and farming on and along the North River.

The instructor will be Bob Jackman, a graduate of Colby College and Wesleyan University. He has taught similar courses at the Marshfield and Scituate senior centers, where the courses have consistently sold out.

EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS

CodeRed Please take the time to register your home and cell phone numbers with CodeRed the Plymouth County Sheriff's Department emergency notification system. This allows you to receive important reverse 9-1-1 calls in the event of emergencies. Registration can be accessed by visiting www.pcsdma.org.

Norwell Police EMAS Sign up for the Norwell Police Department Emergency Announcement System (EMAS) by visiting their website at <u>www.norwellpolice.com</u>. Don't have a computer, visit the COA and we'll help you register.

My Senior Center There are times when a reverse 911 call may made to inform residents of important information however, many residents lose home phone service during power outages. The Council on Aging invites you to list your cell phone information our database as well as any information for those "at risk" with a disability, using oxygen or any other risk-related concerns and emergency contacts. Please note that this information is kept confidential and only shared with emergency personnel as needed.

WINTER WATCH

As the cold weather approaches, here are some things to keep in mind.

- During severe weather emergencies, a shelter may be available at the Norwell Middle School.
- Keep heat at a comfortable setting do not skimp and get sick!
- Do not let your oil tank drop below 1/4 full.
- Have someone check on you daily if you are alone.
- Be aware of older or ill neighbors and offer assistance in an emergency.
- Make sure friends get inside their homes when dropped off.
- Have at least one hard-wired phone. Remember that a portable phone will not work in the event of a power outage. Keep cell phones charged.
- Don't overexert yourself when shoveling snow.
- Keep a full tank of gas in your car

STORM SUPPLY CHECKLIST

 Foods (canned goods and nonperishable foods) that don't need cooking; Special dietary foods

- Utensils, such as, a manual can opener, disposable plates, cups, forks, knives spoons, etc.
- Drinking water in non-breakable containers (one gallon per person per day)
- Identification, valuable papers, policies and photographs in a waterproof container
- Personal hygiene items
- First aid kit
- Medications, prescription and over the counter, such as aspirin and antacid
- Specific medical information
- Personal aids, such as, eyeglasses, hearing aids, canes, etc.
- Pet food/care items
- Books and magazines
- Battery-operated radio, Flashlight and extra batteries
- Matches
- Sleeping bag or blanket, sheet and pillow
- Cold Weather clothing, outerwear and footwear
- Tool kit
- Cash

Were you in the "donut hole" last year? If so, chances are you could reach it again! Then you will pay 45% of the cost of brand name drugs and 65% for generics. Think what that means, a \$300 brand name drug will now cost you \$135! This is where Prescription Advantage can help.
