OUTREACH NEWS with Dee Dee

Little darling, it's been a long cold lonely winter Little darling, it feels like years since it's been here Here comes the sun, here comes the sun And I say it's all right - George Harrison

As the song says, it really has been a long cold lonely winter. So many of you have shared with me that this winter has been the worst you have ever seen, I know it's the worst I have ever seen! We all remember the Blizzard of 1978 that was in a class by itself, but the amount of snow we have had this year is unprecedented and left many of us frustrated with trying to get someone to shovel, plow, and remove snow from our roofs, not to mention the ice dams and leaks throughout the house! On top of all that it's been difficult being stuck inside for so long.

With the frustrations that we all have faced this winter, I've received many calls from seniors and family members with questions regarding selling the family home. As we all know, home ownership has many benefits as well as challenges. Should I/we sell? Where should I/we go? What should I/we do with all the stuff? Add to that the emotional attachment to the family home.

Selling the family home can be a very difficult decision, but for so many it is the right decision. The alternatives available in this area are many, we have senior housing, over 55 and over 62 housing, and assisted living, to name a few.

Planning your future housing needs is an important part of ensuring that you continue to thrive as you get older. Of course every adult is different so the senior housing choice that's right for one person may not be suitable for you. The key to making the best choice is to match your housing with your lifestyle, health, and financial needs. This may mean modifying your own home to make it safer; you may be eligible for the Small Housing Grant to assist you in achieving that goal. Or, for you, it could mean moving to a housing facility with more support and social options available on site.

When deciding if moving or staying in your family home is right for you, please feel free to call the COA. We have information on assistance with making your home safer, different housing options, as well as area businesses that assist in the moving/cleaning out process. Please feel free to call me with any questions or you may have regarding making this big decision.

Thankfully we are now approaching spring and with that sunshine, warmer days, daylight savings time and the ability to get outside, finally!

STREET NUMBERS ARE LIFE SAVERS

Local emergency personnel often have difficulty locating an address number on homes when trying to respond to emergency and life threatening calls. Some structures have no number, numbers may be hidden by landscaping or are distorted due to age and weather. This slows down response time. Here are some suggestions to help EMS respond faster:

- Numbers should be on contrasting backgrounds
- Place your number where they can easily be seen from the street.
- Numbers should be reflective so they can be seen at night.
- Place numbers to the left, right or directly above your entrance.
- Place numbers on **both** sides of your mailbox.
- If your home is on a corner, numbers should face the street named in your official address.

NFD "SENIOR SAFE" PROGRAM

The Norwell Fire Services in conjunction with the Council on Aging will offer a safety inspection for Norwell residents age 60 and older looking to remain in their homes. Inspections include determining if you need a new smoke and CO_2 detector installation, batteries, night lights, house numbers and a risk assessment. In some cases, items may be provided and installed for free. Additional recommendations may be made to keep individuals safe in their home. This program is made possible through a grant and is available on the third Wednesday of each month. Please call the COA office at 781-659-7878 to schedule an appointment.

DON"T FORGET TO SPRING FORWARD

Don't forget to turn your clocks ahead one hour on Sun. Mar. 8. This is a good time to check and change your batteries in your smoke and CO_2 detectors!



TELEPHONE REASSURANCE

The Telephone Reassurance program provides a phone call to a resident Monday through Friday to check on their well-being. You can decide how often and when you would like to be called; it could be daily, weekly; bi-weekly or whatever works best for you. If you feel that you, a family member or friend may benefit from receiving a call, please contact Dee Dee Obert in the COA office.

FUEL ASSISTANCE ENDS APRIL 30

Applications are being accepted for the 2014/2015 fuel assistance program. Eligibility is based on household size and the gross annual income of every household member 18 years of age or older. Household income cannot exceed 60% of the estimated State Median Income. The FY 2015 income cannot exceed \$32,618 for a household of one and \$42,654 for a household of two which is 60% of the Estimated State Median Income.

The program provides assistance through a fixed benefit amount for the cost of the primary source of heat which includes but is not limited to: oil, electricity, natural gas, propane, kerosene, wood, or coal.

Payments for actual usage or fuel delivery are made directly to the heating vendor for primary energy needs from November 1st to April 30th except when the cost of heating is included in the rent.

If eligible, discounts are automatically given on electric bills for investor owned electric utilities, and gas bills for investor-owned gas utilities.

IN CASE OF EMERGENCIES: INFORMATION IS THE KEY!

This winter, our sleepy town found itself in the midst of a serious weather related crisis. Twice, the Board of Selectmen declared a State of Emergency; there were also concerns about snow removal, trash collection and the general condition of the streets. Whether it's snow or a hurricane, there are several information outlets to help keep you informed. While information can often be found on local cable channels and radio stations WATD, you can also sign up to receive email and telephone notifications. Here is how: **Norwell Police EMAS** Sign up for the Norwell Police Department Emergency Announcement System (EMAS) by visiting their website at <u>www.norwellpolice.com</u> and provide your email address. You will then receive important email messages.

CodeRed Please take the time to register your home and cell phone numbers with CodeRed, the Plymouth County Sheriff's Department emergency notification system. This allows you to receive important reverse 9-1-1 calls in the event of emergencies. Registration can be accessed by visiting <u>www.pcsdma.org.</u>



Town Election

The Annual Town Election is scheduled for Saturday, May 16, 2015 at the Norwell Middle School. Polling hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. Absentee ballots are usually available 2 to 3 weeks prior to the election. Anyone that cannot make it to the polls should consider an Absentee Ballot. Please call the Town Clerk's office and request and an application to obtain an Absentee Ballot.

A sample ballot will be posted at the COA when it becomes available.

Voter Registration

Voter Registration forms can be forwarded to anyone who is not registered in Norwell or who has moved to a different address in Norwell. The deadline to make this change for the Town Meeting and the Election is Friday, April 24, 2015. The Town Clerk's office will be open from 8:00 a.m. -8:00 p.m. on that date.

Political Parties

Please note that there are now two more Political Parties to choose for registration. One is the United Independent Party (not to be confused with the Unenrolled Party) and the Green-Rainbow Party. Both of these parties gained the official status during the last State Election. Massachusetts now has five Political Parties. Democratic, Republican, Green-Rainbow, United Independent Party and Unenrolled. Parties with official status can hold primaries and field candidates under their party banners.

WRECK OF THE SS MARINE ELECTRIC

The SS Marine Electric, a 605-foot coal carrier sank on February 12, 1983, about 30 miles off the coast of Virginia. Thirty-one of the 34 crewmembers perished; the three survivors endured 90 minutes drifting in the frigid waters of the Atlantic. The wreck resulted in some of the most important maritime reforms in the second half of the 20th century.
